First, our authors are certainly busy. At any given time, we have authors who are giving a reading or speaking at a book festival or delivering a paper at an academic conference. It seems they post events and photographs more than we do. They are also winning awards, being recognized for their craft, and are enlarging their audiences as the days pass.


Second, our staff is genuinely interested in what they do each day at the Press. They care deeply about our books and the role books have in our culture and society. While trying to make ends meet, the Mercer University Press staff is most interested in how our authors and their books impact readers and our society.

Third, there are some interesting trends in publishing. One trend is that of the continuing rise of independent bookstores. These warriors among the giants (aka chain stores and online behemoths) are beginning to hold their own in a world where they were never given a chance by the prognosticators only a few years ago. Another trend is that e-books have reached a plateau and sales are stagnant. Even students prefer to read print books rather than e-books.

Small independent publishers and small independent bookstores are combining to make a huge impact. And you can follow the playby-play on Facebook or Twitter. Do so, and then go visit your local independent bookstore. Read an author you have never read, especially one published by a smaller publisher. There are some great writers out there. And very few of them ever end up on the best-seller list.



WHEN IT IS A HEALING THEY NEED, THE PEOPLE AT CHRISTIAN BEND, Tennessee, turn to one woman—Burdy Luttrell.

Melungeon by birth, Burdy learned the therapeutic properties of roots from the women in her family. THE POISONED TABLE PORTRAYS A PASSIONATE RIVALRY BETWEEN FICTIONAL actress Isabel Graves and real-life Shakespearian stage sensation Frances Anne "Fanny" Kemble.

In this tale of ambition, romance, and betrayal, Graves harbors early resentment, convinced that Kemble's family theatre connections assured Fanny's selection for the lead role in *Romeo and Juliet* despite Isabel's superior beauty and talent. The novel traces their unconnected adventures and acting careers in the Old and New Worlds, as well as their introduction to the horrors of American slavery and to romance with one of the wealthiest men in America, Pierce Butler, owner of Georgia cotton and rice plantations and master of more than 800 slaves.

Kemble, an ardent abolitionist, falls in love with Butler and marries him before she discovers his wealth derives soley from slave labor. Though glad to be separated from plantation life at her husband's Philadelphia home, Kemble agrees to accompany him on his annual visit to inspect his Georgia investments. Butler assures his wife her apprehensions about slavery will be assuaged once she sees firsthand its humane daily operation. Instead, she is sickened and chronicles her visit in *Journal of a Residence on a Georgian Plantation in 1838–1839*. This account, published in England in 1863, is sometimes credited with dissuading Britain from aiding the Confederacy.

Within the novel is a play written by Graves' lover. Set on a slave plantation, the plot portrays a dinner at the master's table and the poisonous conditions which produce its bounty, resulting in an attempted murder. In the controversy following this play's opening night, Kemble and Graves are again at odds, and their rivalry continues as they change places on the stage of theatre and of life.





IN SPRING 1962, A YOUNG BLACK GIRL NAMED ETTA HEMSLEY IS KILLED at a civil rights demonstration on a university campus in Atlanta. The next day, the home of Jovita Curry, a black woman in Overton, Georgia, is burned.


Both events are etched into the memory of Cole Bishop and eerily play out the predictions of a former classmate named Marie Fitzpatrick. Both Cole and Marie are high school seniors when they first meet in fall 1954. Cole, like his classmates, is a native-born Southerner influenced by the traditions of segregation as a way of life. Marie is a recent transplant from Washington, DC, a brilliant and assertive nonconformist with bold predictions about a new world that is about to be ushered in by the force of desegregation. Included in her prophecy is a warning for Cole that will cause him to leave the South to live and teach in Vermont. The odd friendship between the two of them continues after high school in a series of tender and revealing letters.

The story revolves around the fiftieth-year reunion of the Overton High School class of 1955, rekindling for Cole memories of Etta Hemsley's death and the unsolved mystery of the burning of Jovita Curry's home. His return for the reunion reunites him with classmates who, over time, have accepted a guarded assimilation of the races. He is also reacquainted with two black men Moses Elder, the town's mayor, and Littlejohn Curry, a reclusive artist who carries the scars of the burned house, and in those encounters, Cole understands clearly the influence of Marie on his life. The Book of Marie is the story of a generation-whites and blacks-who ignited the war of change. Yet, it is also as much about the power of place—the finding of home—as it is about the history of events.



There in the low-rolling hills and slow-moving creeks of Middle Georgia he tells—with good humor and reflection—stories about his family, and how for generations farm-to-table food was a mainstay in their daily lives. He also relates how food was the common denominator for all aspects of life in the South, especially in small towns and rural communities.

Barrett shares his need to leave behind those days of stewed squash and fried okra, and move on to what he felt were more sophisticated and global offerings. He discovered, however, that while he tried to take his palate of out of Dixie, there was always some Georgia red clay in his blood—and in his taste buds.

Successfully melding those early days of learning the basics of Southern fare and later stretching his culinary skills, Barrett demonstrates in this narrative his formula for a successful casual dinner or a formal black tie affair. With several menus and 100 recipes ranging from down-home picnic offerings such as 'Joyce's Don't Mess with Success Pimento Cheese' to a magnificent platter of 'Grouper Meunière,' the author provides a wonderful array of delights for contemporary cooks.

This culinary love letter to Barrett's parents and other loved ones who raised him will make you laugh, maybe shed a tear, and fill your hearts with a renewed appreciation for the magic that can happen in a family's kitchen.



THE ALLMAN BROTHERS BAND WAS FORMED IN 1969 BY DUANE AND GREGG Allman, along with Berry Oakley, Dickey Betts, Butch Trucks, and "Jaimoe." Their musical combination of the elements of rock, blues, jazz, and country was hugely successful and continues to stand the test of time. Tragically, both Duane Allman and Berry Oakley were killed in separate motorcycle accidents in 1971 and 1972 respectively, but the band endured with the remaining original members and additional members for forty-five years. Inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1995, The Allman Brothers Band received gold and platinum sales awards for their recordings.

Filled with more than two hundred captioned images, this new book chronicles Weston's collection and other items of The Allman Brothers Band memorabilia from 1969–1976. Weston and Perkins discuss in detail the various categories and aspects of band collectibles from that period. A history of one of the nation's elite journalism schools and home of the Peabody Awards

The Henry W. Grady College of Journalism and Mass Communication

was founded in 1915 by Steadman Vincent Sanford who as president (1932–35) and chancellor of the University System of Georgia (1935–45), was architect of the modern University of Georgia. Its second graduate John Eldridge Drewry (1922), the school's longest serving director and dean (1932–69), created a national reputation for the school and was the subject of a sensational trial that resulted from a near fatal shooting in 1949.


Drewry established the Peabody Awards in 1940, which remains the oldest and most prestigious award in all electronic media. Many Grady alumni have gone on to brilliant careers, among them Tom Johnson, who headed LBJ's broadcasting empire in Texas before becoming publisher of the *Los Angeles Times* and CEO of CNN. His classmate, Charlayne Hunter-Gault would become, along with Hamilton Holmes, the first African-American to enroll at UGA.

This account details the evolution of a college that is among the nation's elite, with a selective undergraduate program (juniors and seniors only) and an impressive 99.1 percent graduation rate. The Grady College maintains a nationally reknowned graduate research program with study abroad programs and internships, and is a leader in international research and outreach. Housed within Grady College are the Center for Health and Risk Communication, a "think-tank of scholars" and the New Media Institute.

Clark explores the relationships forged between Atlanta's major brands and the Grady College, as well as its role in the political culture of Georgia and the nation.



First sent to the Cumberland Gap as part of the Confederate defensive strategy, they were met with Unionist activity in East Tennessee, participated in early battles in Kentucky and stymied an impending Federal invasion through the Gap. As the war progressed, they habitually found themselves in the thickest fighting at Murfreesboro, Chickamauga, and Missionary Ridge, and held the "Dead Angle" at Kennesaw Mountain. The 11th took heavy casualties assaulting the Federal lines in the desperate fighting around Atlanta, and broke the Union defenses at Franklin in some of the war's most brutal hand-to-hand combat. Follow the survivors to Nashville for Hood's futile attempt to regain the Tennessee capital, and then continue on to Bentonville and their final surrender at Greensboro.


This book takes the reader into their camps, on the march, and onto the line of battle through first-hand accounts taken from diaries, letters, and journals. Many never-before-published photographs of the soldiers, newly created battle maps, as well as an extensive biographical roster make this a valuable resource for historians and genealogists, and a great addition to the story of the Army of Tennessee and the war in the West. **M. Todd Cathey** has been a student of the Civil War for over thirty years. Growing up in Middle Tennessee, his interest in the Civil War developed at an early age. His primary focus is the common soldier in the Western Theater. Cathey holds several advanced degrees including two earned doctorates.

A lifelong resident of Nashville, Tennessee, **Gary W. Waddey** received a BA degree from Vanderbilt University in 1978. Shortly afterwards, he joined Northwestern Mutual where he served on numerous advisory committees and was a frequent speaker at regional and national meetings. Waddey remained with the company for 33 years until his retirement in 2011. He is a frequent contributor to local historical publications.





A KILLING ON RING JAW BLUFF RECOUNTS THE RISE AND FALL OF GEORGIA'S rural population as told through the story of Charles Graves Rawlings. His life followed that of cotton-based agriculture after the Civil War and along with it the rise and fall of Georgia's small towns. From modest beginnings as a liveryman, he acquired nearly 40,000 acres of land, as well as a bank, a railroad, and diverse other businesses. By 1920, he was one of the state's wealthier men, with a loving wife and family, and powerful political connections. Five years later he was facing a sentence of life in prison for his role in the alleged murder of his first cousin, Gus Tarbutton.

The growth of wealth in rural Georgia during the first two decades of the twentieth century was dramatic, as was the economic crash that accompanied and followed the so-called Great Recession of 1920-21. While the rest of the nation recovered rapidly, transitioning to the era of the Roaring Twenties, the rural South remained mired in social and financial despair.

The forces that led to this economic whipsaw were multiple, including the loosening of credit and inflation that accompanied and followed World War I, the effective monetization of cotton as a commodity, the competition for labor from the industrialized North, and the bubble in cotton prices that burst in 1920. Although the boll weevil arrived in the state in 1915, it was only in 1921 that the pest began to severely affect the cotton crop. By then other economic forces were in play, relegating the role of the weevil to that of delivering a final blow to an already moribund economy. This is the story of rural Georgia that foreshadowed our own day, our own story.


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

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

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BECOME A HUMAN BEING? This question was persistently repeated by Kierkegaard scholar Howard V. Hong (1912–2010) to students during his forty-year tenure at St. Olaf College. As one of Dr. Hong's students, Jamie Lorentzen never forgot the question—one that always pointed to the ethical upbuilding of individuals. Lorentzen lets this question set the tone in literature classes he has been teaching for more than twenty-five years.

In Becoming Human: Kierkegaardian Reflections on Ethical Models in Literature, Lorentzen's Kierkegaard studies inform commentary on how central characters in four works of literature help readers answer Howard Hong's question.

Twain's Huck Finn becomes human by being an unwitting ethicist despite himself and the pro-slavery culture in which he was reared. Ishmael and Queequeg's embrace of the neighbor and outcast in Melville's *Moby-Dick* is an ethical counterpoint to Ahab's terrifying narcissism. Meanwhile, Ibsen's famous narcissist, Peer Gynt, offers an archetypal negative ethical model for becoming human. Finally, Dostoevsky's Father Zosima and Ivan and Alyosha Karamazov show how ethics informs human development in both secular and religious cultures.

Underlying Lorentzen's thesis of becoming human are questions like What do these books have to do with my life? Why should I take time to read them well? Lorentzen's answer frames the Introduction. The book's Coda remembers Dr. Hong and the seemingly impossible questions he posed about life and literature that nonetheless are not impossible,but instead, according to Lorentzen, are "simply questions that evoke the possible in us all."



This 24,000 word autobiography offers a rare perspective on life during the most transformative years of US history

HOUSTON HARTSFIELD HOLLOWAY (1844-1917) WAS BORN ENSLAVED in upcountry Georgia, taught himself to read and write, learned the blacksmith trade, was emancipated by Union victory in 1865, and served as an ordained traveling preacher in the African Methodist Episcopal Church from 1870 to 1883. He devoted the remainder of his life to his family, his blacksmith trade, and his local church. Holloway's 24,000-word autobiography offers a rare working-class perspective on life during some of the most transformative years of US history.

Holloway describes slavery, his family (often fractured by slave sales), friends, religious experiences, courtship and marriage, neighborhood parties and games, work and work songs, and interactions with slave owners. His vivid account of the arrival of federal troops and his subsequent emancipation describes how he and his neighbors adjusted to freedom, constructing new family living arrangements, new employment compacts, and new civil and church relations.

Holloway recounts his challenges as an itinerant AME preacher in the postwar South, his church's onerous financial demands, his poor and uncertain pay, annual relocations, and church politics. After thirteen years of itinerant ministry Holloway quit, bought a homestead, and worked at his blacksmith trade. Writing his autobiography in his sixties, Holloway reflects on the successes and disappointments of his life and the moral and material condition of his people.

Footnotes provide supplementary biographical information for nearly two hundred relatives, neighbors, friends, and coworkers named in Holloway's narrative. An appendix includes nineteen extended biographical sketches. The book is illustrated with photographs and three detailed maps of Holloway's home neighborhoods and preaching assignments.



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Between Fetters and Freedom

African American Baptists since Emancipation *Edward R. Crowther* and *Keith Harper*, editors



Essays exploring a rich diversity of post-emancipation life for a largely understudied group of Baptists

IN THE WAKE OF THE AMERICAN CIVIL WAR, FREED PEOPLE OF COLOR WHO had either worshipped with their former masters or observed their faith privately now enjoyed a measure of freedom and self-determination. Baptist ranks swelled as new converts joined the faithful in building new churches, organizing mission and educational societies, and openly exercising their faith. In short, it was a rich, diverse experience that merits further inquiry.

The essays in *Between Fetters and Freedom: African American Baptists since Emancipation* explore a number of issues bearing on post-Civil War African American Baptists. With limited resources at their disposal, precisely what did freedom mean? Would African American Baptist organizations be recognized as legitimate by white peer organizations? What sort of internal stress would African American organizations face as they gained traction in the black community, and what sort of stress would a rapidly changing culture place on those organizations and the people who made them what they were? Through it all, preachers and lay people alike wondered how their voices would be heard above the din.

As the title suggests, emancipation inaugurated a time of freedom. True, the Civil War ended slavery and African American Baptists are no longer in fetters, but the War did not eradicate racism. Arguably, even in well-defined religious circles complete freedom remains tinged with uncertainty and in some respects unfulfilled. A native of Vicksburg, Mississippi, **Edward R. Crowther** is professor of History at Adams State University. He is the author of *Southern Evangelicals and the Coming of the Civil War*, along with numerous articles and reviews.

Keith Harper is professor of Baptist Studies at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary in Wake Forest, North Carolina. He is the editor of Send the Light: Lottie Moon's Letters and Other Writings and Rescue the Perishing: Selected Letters from Annie Armstrong and Other Writings.

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
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
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
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
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






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
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




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Religion, Hope, and the Reshaping of the Athletic Enhancement Debate

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
Examining hope as a spiritual dimension of sport—how hope is morally relevant to the sport enhancement debate

SHOULD HIGH-TECH PROSTHETIC LIMBS BE PERMISSIBLE IN ELITE SPORTS competitions? Why are caffeine and altitude tents usually acceptable while some cold medications are not? What will happen as we engineer new enhancing options such as genetic modification technologies that increase muscle strength, or individualized nutritional genomic programs for elite athletes? The ethics debate about the use of enhancements in elite sport is becoming increasingly complex. Yet we are not asking what relevance sports' religious dimension has to this debate.

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Using Christian theological reflection to problematize the four main approaches to the ethical question of enhancement use in elite sport, and the underlying values informing these approaches, Trothen asks: How will hope in sport potentially be affected by techno-science? And how might a valuing of sports' spiritual dimension—and particularly hope—reshape the sport enhancement debate? The clear conclusion is that sports' spiritual dimension includes hope, and the locations of hope in sport are morally relevant to the sport enhancement discussion. **Tracy J. Trothen** is associate professor of Theology and Ethics at Queen's University in Kingston, Ontario. Trothen holds a ThD degree from Emmanuel College, University of Toronoto. She is author of several publications including *Shattering the Illusion: Child Sexual Abuse and Canadian Religious Institutions* and is coeditor of two anthologies, *Religion and Sexuality: Diversity and the Limits of Tolerance* and *Religion and Transhumanism: The Unknown Future of Human Enhancement.*

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
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
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
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
The Imitation of Christ has appeared in more editions and in more languages than any other book except the Bible. Samuel Johnson once remarked to Bowell that it "must be a good book, as the world has opened its arms to receive it." Others have praised it as well, including Thomas Carlyle, George Eliot, Thomas De Quincey, and Matthew Arnold. Among the religious, St. Ignatius Loyola translated it, and Pope John Paul I was said to have been reading it the night that he died. It has been standard fare in religious training and personal devotion for centuries.

Yet today, few people know the Imitation and those who do more often than not think it hopelessly out of date, a pre-Vatican II relic, full of contempt for the world and self-loathing. It is a curious state of affairs, and one that reveals more about a contemporary audience's response to the book than it does about the book itself. When a contemporary reader encounters a line such as "this is the highest wisdom: through contempt of the world to aspire to the kingdom of heaven," his response is a very different one from that of a fifteenth- or nineteenthcentury reader. For an "uninformed response" (as Stanley Fish would say) to the contemptus mundi theme, the reader must draw deeply on a vast complex of literary, linguistic, historical, and theological knowledge.

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William C. Creasy is a retired UCLA professor whose love for the Imitation is both professional and personal. He first discovered the book as a college student and read it out of academic interest. In graduate school, he used sixteenth century English translations of the Imitation to study the development of English prose. And when, like Dante, he found himself lost at the halfway point in life's journey, he returned to the Imitation and found spiritual guidance that led him to Christian faith. So for Creasy, translating the Imitation is not merely an academic activity—it is a labor of love and spiritual devotion. He is the creator of www.logosbiblestudy.org.

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
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
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


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


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
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


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
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
